Confraternity of Our Lady of Perpetual Help and St. Alphonsus

Part I.

The Archconfraternity

1. **Origin**

Although devotion to Our Lady of Perpetual Help needs no introduction in the United States and Canada, still, for the benefit of those not familiar with it, we give in the following pages of the Manual, together with facts regarding the Archconfraternity, a brief outline of the history of the Miraculous Picture. This wonderful picture was restored to public veneration in Rome 1866. The devotion to Our Lady under the title of "Perpetual Help" grew so rapidly after the picture had been set up for public veneration, as related in Part II, that,

the faithful earnestly desired that a confraternity be established in Rome. Our Blessed Mother had proved during the space of five years that she had set up for herself in the Church of St. Alphonsus a throne

of grace and mercy.

Realizing the great good that was accomplished, and desiring further to extend and make better known this loving kindness and incessant help of Mary, and to solidify the devotion in the hearts of the faithful, the confraternity was established under the patronage of Our Lady of Perpetual Help and St. Alphonsus. Very Rev. Father Mauron, Superior General of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, petitioned the Holy See to approve and canonically erect this pious sodality. By a decree dated May 23, 1871 the request was granted. On the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity, June 4, 1871, the confraternity was solemnly established in the Church of St. Alphonsus with appropriate services. This day was memorable because in 1839 on the same date St. Alphonsus had been canonized. At once many clients of Mary inscribed their names in the new confraternity. In a few brief years

it numbered over six thousand, and Pope Pius IX at this time enriched

it with many indulgences.

Another five years elapsed. God had blessed the Confraternity. Through it Mary worked wonders. Each day saw the multitude of members increased. So popular did it become that in several other cities similar sodalities were erected; notably at Pisa, Vienna, Paris and Limerick. Many more would have been founded had they been allowed to combine with that established in Rome.

The Rector Major of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer realized that more good would be accomplished if these various societies already established and those that would be formed under the patronage of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, were affiliated to the one in Rome. More beneficial results and a more widespread devotion would be the result of concerted action. He, therefore, asked the Holy Father to raise the Confraternity in Rome to the dignity of an Arch-Confraternity with the power of aggregating to itself like confraternities established in various places. Pope Pius IX granted this on

March 31, 1876, naming the Superior General of the Congregation its head, at the same time adding more indulgences to those already given. It was at this time, too, that the Feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help was placed on the Church Calendar.

On June 18, 1876 after a solemn triduum, preparatory to the Feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, the Archconfraternity was inaugurated. The name of the Holy Father Pius IX, was the first to be inscribed on the

catalogue of members.

From that day to this the number of confraternities throughout the world affiliated with the Archconfraternity in Rome has been yearly augmented so that in 1925 it numbered 1250 branches with millions of members enrolled.

2. Special Object

All pious associations have a special object in view, particular requirements and peculiar advantages. The aim of this sodality may be summed up under the following heads:

1. To have its members serve and honor the Queen of Heaven under the title of Our Lady of Perpetual Help To strive to spread devotion to her

so that others may do likewise.

2. To have recourse to Our Lady of Perpetual Help in all spiritual and temporal necessities, especially in times of trials, temptations, sufferings and difficulties.

3. Requirements

- 1. It is necessary to be enrolled in the Confraternity catalogue of a church where the Confraternity is canonically erected.
- (N.B. It is canonically established in nearly every Redemptorist Church in the U.S.)
- 2. To make the Act of Consecration to Our Lady of Perpetual Help and St. Alphonsus. This is printed on the enrollment card which you receive. Mark on it your name and the day on which you intend to renew this act of consecration. For any just cause the date may be changed. (Monthly Renewal of Acts of Consecration found on pages 37 and 45 of this Manual.)
- 3. The *Medal* which you receive has the image of Our Lady of Perpetual Help on one side and that of St. Alphonsus on the reverse. This

should be worn, if possible, or at least

kept piously.

(N.B. It is also well to have a little booklet with the history and prayers of the Confraternity. This little "Manual" or other such booklet is appropriate.)

An offering of ten cents is usually requested to cover expense of enrollment card, medal and booklet when application is made for membership.

No fee for Religious.

4. Advantages

- 1. The members are assured of the constant protection of the Mother of Perpetual Help and the intercession of the great St. Alphonsus de Liguori.
- 2. They share in the public devotions, prayers and good works of the thousands of members of the entire Archconfraternity.
- 3. By the express will of the Superior General of the Congregation of the Most Holy Redeemer, members have a special share in the fruits and merits of the Missions, Apostolic Labors, Spiritual Exercises, the Masses, Communions, prayers, penances, and other good works performed by the entire Congregation of

the Redemptorist Fathers and Brothers.

4. Many plenary and partial indulgences accorded by several Popes. A summary is given on the following pages.

5. Those who die as members have many Masses said for them during

the year.

Summary of Indulgences Approved by the Sacred Apostolic Penitentiary, January 20, 1932.

- A. A PLENARY INDULGENCE, on condition of Confession, Communion, Visit to a church or public oratory, and prayer for the intention of the Holy Father, can be gained:
- I. On the day of admission into the confraternity, or on any one of the seven days immediately following.
 - II. By all members:
- 1. On the day when the confraternity in which they are enrolled celebrates its affiliation with the Archconfraternity.
- 2. On the feasts of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in June and St. Alphonsus (August 2), or on any one of the seven days following.
- 3. Four times a year, on any day the members may choose, if they have recited at least once each day the prayer "O most zealous Doctor, St. Alphonsus". Page 45.

- 4. Once a year, on the day when they assist at the Mass celebrated for the souls of deceased members according to the statutes of the Archconfraternity.
 - 5. Once a month:
- a. On any day they choose for the renewal of their consecration to Our Lady of Perpetual Help and to St. Alphonsus which they made on the day of their reception.
- b. If at least once a day for a month they recite the invocations "O Mary, Mother of Perpetual Help, pray for me" "St. Alphonsus, my Protector, in all my needs make me have recourse to Mary".
- 6. As often as, during Triduums and Novenas held in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, they assist at least twice at these services.
- B. A PLENARY INDULGENCE IN THE HOUR OF DEATH, on the usual conditions.
- C. PARTIAL INDULGENCES can be gained by all members who are at least contrite of heart, as follows:
- I. SEVEN YEARS AND SEVEN TIMES FORTY DAYS:
- 1. On the feasts of Our Lady of Good Counsel (April 26), of the Archangels Sts. Gabriel (March 24) and Michael (Sept. 29), of St. Matthew, (Sept. 21), if they visit a church or public oratory and pray for the intention of the Holy Father.
- 2. As often as they attend the exercises of Triduums and Novenas held in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, and pray devoutly for the intention of the Holy Father.

3. Once a day, if they recite the prayer "O most zealous Doctor, St. Alphonsus." Page 45.

11. THREE HUNDRED DAYS:

1. Every day on which they visit a church or public oratory and the picture of Our Lady of Perpetual Help or of St. Alphonsus there exposed, and pray for the intention of the Holy Father.

2. Three times each day, if in the morning, at noon, and in the evening, they devoutly recite the invocations "O Mother of Perpetual Help, pray for me" — "St. Alphonsus, my Protector, in all my needs make

me have recourse to Mary."

111. ONE HUNDRED DAYS once a day, if they piously recite the antiphon "Holy Mary, assist . . . who implore thy Perpetual Help."

IV. SIXTY DAYS, as often as they attend Mass or other divine services in a church or public oratory, or perform any other work of piety or charity which is in accordance

with the purpose of the confraternity.

D. AN ADULT by virtue of which all Masses said by any priest for the soul of a member of the confraternity who died in the grace of God, will be of the same benefit to that soul as if those Masses were said at a privileged altar.

ANTIPHON

Holy Mary, assist the miserable, help the fainthearted, cheer those that weep, pray for the people, be the advocate of the clergy, intercede for the devout female sex; let all feel thine aid who implore thy Perpetual Help.

Practices Recommended to Members

1. To place in their homes a *Picture* of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, to honor her as patron and protectress of the family—to say their usual prayers before the picture. To carry a smaller one in their prayer books.

2. To wear the Medal of the Con-

fraternity constantly.

3. To say every morning and evening Three Hail Marys in honor of Our Lady's Immaculate Conception, and after each the prayer of St. Alphonsus for purity; "By thy Immaculate Conception, O Mary, make my body pure and my soul holy". (Indulgence: 300 days twice a day, morning and evening.)

4. To recite a "Glory be to the Father" each day in honor of St.

Alphonsus.

5. To accustom themselves to the frequent use of the ejaculations: "Mary, Mother of Perpetual Heip,

pray for us!"

"My Protector, St. Alphonsus, in all my wants make me have recourse to Mary!" (Indulg. 300 days 3 times a day — Plenary once a month — for each.)

6. Fervently to prepare to celebrate the Feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, fixed usually for 3rd Sunday in June (Sunday preceding Feast of St. John Baptist, June 24) and that of St. Alphonsus, (Aug. 2) particularly by receiving the Holy Sacraments on these days.

7. To visit as frequently as possible the Shrine of Our Lady of Perpetual Help and pray devoutly be-

fore the miraculous picture.

8. To be familiar with the history of the picture, the benefits accruing from membership in the confraternity, and to strive to spread the wonderful devotion.

9. To attend devotions in honor of Our Blessed Mother especially the

public confraternity devotions.

10. To assist at the Solemn Requiem High Mass which is celebrated each year for those who die as members of the confraternity. This is offered on the first day possible after the Feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, in June.

Not to forget to renew the Acts of Consecration every month on the specified day, if possible after Holy

Communion.

Part II.

The Miraculous Picture

1. History

It is well nigh impossible to know the name of the artist who conceived the sublime idea and was so singularly privileged to paint this favorite picture of the Madonna. Judging from the style and manner of the original painting, it must have been executed about the latter part of the 14th century. Originally it was on the Island of Crete. How it subsequently came to be set up for public veneration in 1499 in Rome is corded on a well authenticated document, a copy of which was recently The original document hung near the picture in the Church of St. Matthew, the Apostle.

A certain merchant, a native of Crete, (whether through avarice or misplaced devotion it is not certain) stole away the Image of the Virgin, which had worked many miracles in a church on the Island of Crete. Taking passage on a ship, he wrapped up the picture in his belongings and set

out to sea. A violent tempest arose so that the sailors feared for their safety, and although they knew nothing of the Image on board, prayed fervently to God and the Blessed Virgin to be spared from the impending danger. With God's help they arrived safely in port. That same year the merchant came to Rome, carrying the

Image with him.

Stricken down with disease, he betook himself to a Roman friend and asked him to care for him in his sickness. Despite skilful nursing the sick man grew worse, until it was evident that his end was at hand. In those last moments of his earthly existence the Image of Mary which he had stolen from its sanctuary in Crete and still retained in his belongings, was uppermost in his thoughts. Calling his friend, he tearfully besought him to promise one last favor.

The promise was solemnly given. Then the dying man told the whole story of the picture concealed in his merchandise, and added: "Since my death will prevent the restoration of the picture to public veneration in the place where I had determined to bring it, I beg you to have it placed in whichever church of Rome you may

deem most suitable, in order that it may again receive the homage of the faithful."

Shortly afterward, the Cretan merchant, in whom devotion and dishonesty were so strangely blended, died a Christian death, confident that his friend would fulfil his last request. Unknowingly and even unwillingly the merchant had helped along the designs of God Who willed that the Image of His Mother should find a new abode in the Eternal City whence she would extend her maternal assistance into many more regions than when the picture was enthroned in the segregated Island of Crete.

The friend to whose care the dying merchant had committed the precious picture, was a man of weak and fickle character, who allowed himself to be dominated by his capricious and hot tempered wife. Moreover, his father, a crafty and avaricious old man, dwelt with him. On the weaknesses and passions of these three the devil expended all his arts, that he might persuade them to exert a rigorous resistance to the designs of the Mother of God. The wife, charmed by the beauty of the picture found among the belongings of the Cretan mer-

chant, took immediate possession of it and put it in her bed chamber. The husband hesitated to oppose the wishes of his wife, who was determined that the beautiful picture

should not leave the house.

To overcome the culpable weakness of the dead merchant's friend, some extraordinary sign from heaven was necessary. One night he had a dream —one of those exceptional dreams that give clear evidence of their origin and of their purpose. He seemed to behold the Blessed Virgin, who reminded him in an affectionate yet serious tone, that he was doing wrong in retaining possession of the picture which should be exposed in a public church. On awakening, the man felt serious qualms of conscience for his inexcusable failure to fulfil his promise. Nevertheless he felt incapable of opposing the wishes of his wife, and so he tried to persuade himself that the occurrence was not a heavensent warning, but only the meaningless fantasy of a dream.

Our Blessed Lady repeated the warning, but the result was the same. A third time she spoke, adding solemnly: "If you do not have my picture placed in some church, you

shall die." Terrified by this dread threat, the man mustered up the courage to give an account of his dreams to his wife, asserting at the same time his intention to fulfil the promise made to the dying merchant. Enraged at her husband's words, the woman burst into a torrent of abuse at his folly and gullibility in trusting so readily in dreams. "Do you think I am a heathen," she cried, "unworthy of possessing a picture of Our Lady? Am I not a Christian?" Overwhelmed by the violence of invective, the weakling lost all his courage and remained silent—and thus filled up the measure of his iniquity. However, the Mother of God in her mercy and compassion wished to warn the unhappy man of his approaching punishment, in order that, although unable to avoid the death of the body, he might at least escape the death of the soul, and so for the last time she appeared to him in sleep, and said: "I have warned you repeatedly to bring me forth from here, and you have disobeyed my command. Now you yourself must leave this house—then I shall find a more honorable place."

A few days later there issued from the door of the house a mournful procession, bearing the body of the man who had showed himself so unfaithful to the promise made at the death-

bed of the Cretan merchant.

The widow and her father-in-law do not seem to have discerned the connection between the sudden death of the master of the house, and the threefold warning that had come to him in sleep. At any rate, they continued to keep possession of the picture as if nothing had happened. It was necessary for Our Lady herself to intervene again in order to overcome this blind obstinacy. One night the Blessed Virgin warned the headstrong woman in a dream to give up the picture for public exposition, adding that if her command were transgressed the woman and her fatherin-law would be punished with death. The woman was terrified, and resolved to obey. But the old man succeeded in deterring her from this resolution, by painting in glowing colors the rich reward that would accrue from the sale of the picture, and that would prove a providential means of restoring the family fortune. seems incredible that these could so obstinately resist the oftrepeated warnings of God. Fortunately, they were dealing with Mary, so good and so merciful, who was willing to give this disobedient pair another chance. The woman had a little daughter, a child of about seven years. It was through this innocent little one that Our Lady finally overcome the obstinacy of the old man

and his daughter-in-law.

One day, while the child was alone in the room where the picture was hanging, she saw before her a most beautiful lady, of kind and gracious mien who said to her: "Go and say to your mother and to your grandfather, 'The Blessed Virgin Mary of Perpetual Help admonishes you to take her from your house or you shall die'." These few words of God's holv Mother contain a revelation of the utmost importance. The expression Blessed Virgin Mary of Perpetual Help" had never been heard before, and so it was by the lips of Our Lady Herself that this consoling title was first pronounced. Up to that time our picture had no special title; the nearest approach to such being "Our Lady of Crete." The Cretan merchant had not mentioned the title under which it was venerated in his native land, or if he had done so, the

name probably in Greek, and hence difficult to remember—had been forgotten. Our Blessed Lady herself desired to assume this new title of "Perpetual Help" in order to express the inexhaustible power of her protection and the unlimited goodness of her maternal heart.

The little girl so highly favored as to be chosen by Mary as her mes-senger, ran immediately to her mother and told with her innocent lips the story which the child herself could not have invented. The mother was overcome with emotion and began to weep aloud, realizing clearly that she had despised the commands of Our Blessed Lady and had thus been the cause of her husband's death.

A woman who lived nearby heard the cries, and hurried to find out the reason for so great affliction. This time Satan endeavored by means of this circumstance to destroy the sacred image. Hearing the cause of the weeping, the neighbor smiled and with an air of sympathetic condescension said: "Poor foolish creature to believe such nonsense! Our Ladv is in heaven, and does not concern herself about a mere picture. Here, I'll take it, if you have not the courage yourself, and throw it into the fire, and you'll see that it will burn up like any other piece of wood." The widow, however, rejected this proposal and the other took her departure, full of scorn at what she considered superstitious folly. But that very evening the irreverent woman was seized with what appeared to be a pestilential fever that coursed like fire through her veins. The unhappy creature recognized in this sudden illness the hand of God chastising her for the insult she had offered to the picture of Our Lady, and with tears streaming from her eyes hastened to the picture and implored pardon for her offence. How bountiful the mercy of God's Mother! In a single instant the woman was cured of her dreadful malady. The widow was present at this scene. The two women, deeply moved embraced each other and promised to have the picture publicly exposed as soon as possible under the title of Perpetual Help. The spirit of darkness was vanquished. Our Lady was victorious. Nothing now remained but to select one of the many churches of Rome to be sanctuary of the Mother of Perpetual Help. Again, however, Our Blessed

Lady miraculously manifested her pleasure. Appearing as before to the widow's little daughter, Mary said: "Go and tell your mother to have my picture exposed between the Basilicas of St. Mary Major and St. John Lateran, in the Church dedicated to St. Matthew."

Accordingly, on the 27th of March, 1499, a most imposing ceremony took place before the assembled clergy and people of Rome. The picture was borne in triumphant procession through the streets of the Eternal City, and placed in the beautiful church she had so singularly selected for her future dwelling place. It was from this sanctuary she would continue to dispense her special graces and favors to the multitudes who would there seek her maternal protection.

In the year 1798 the Revolution swept over Europe, and as the many venerated monuments of religious antiquity fell before the hordes of merciless fanatics, this Blessed Sanctuary was not overlooked.

Amidst the devastation which spread sorrow and sadness on all sides, the news reached the afflicted inhabitants of Rome that the ancient Church of St. Matthew was to be destroyed, and that the Shrine of Our Lady of Perpetual Help which it contained would be desecrated. The event, alas! was only too soon to be realized.

With the destruction of their church the Augustinians were obliged to bid adieu to their beloved home and seek shelter in Santa Maria in Posterula, which church Pope Pius VII eventu-

ally committed to their care.

Notwithstanding the sad circumstances that accompanied their removal, the afflicted community did not omit to take with them the Miraculous Picture they so dearly prized. On account of the troublesome times, however, it was no longer exposed to public veneration, and was soon lost sight of by the people.

The Miraculous Picture is Confided to the Redemptorists in Rome

It was not until the year 1866 that the Miraculous Picture was again exposed to the veneration of the faithful. During the long years which intervened between the Revolutionary period and the above date, many changes had taken place in the Capital of the Christian world. Among others. the beautiful Church of St. Alphonsus had sprung up on the ancient ruins of St. Matthew's and the Miraculous Picture had been confided, in a very providential manner, to the Redemptorists, who now occupied the site of

the once celebrated sanctuary.

By order of Pope Pius IX, December 11, 1865, the picture was transferred to the Redemptorists, to be returned to the spot chosen by the Blessed Mother herself for the veneration of the faithful. Therefore, one beautiful morning in April 1866 there issued forth from the modest dwelling of the Redemptorists a solemn procession, bearing aloft to the gaze of the delighted inhabitants of Rome the Miraculous Image of the Queen of Heaven. The streets through which the procession was to pass were thronged with eager spectators, who were anxious to catch a glimpse of the long hidden and well-nigh forgotten treasure they had once so highly venerated.

As the triumphant procession was slowly wending its way beneath the beautiful arches and decorated balconies of the Eternal City, at frequent intervals cries of joy and exclamations of praise went up from the surging masses in thanksgiving for the many favors their beloved Benefactress was showering down upon them as she was carried along. The picture was then placed over the High altar in the Church of St. Alphonsus.

Ever since that memorable day of April 26, the holy enthusiasm which inflamed the hearts of the Roman people has increased with time, and now the devotion to Our Dear Mother of Perpetual Help extends throughout the entire world.

Such is a brief history of the Miraculous Picture of Our Blessed Lady of Perpetual Help. The Image venerated at our Shrine resembles the original, not only in design and coloring, but principally in the many favors which Almighty God has accorded through the intercession of His ever Blessed and Immaculate Mother to those who visit it.

2. Description of the Miraculous Picture

The picture of Our Lady of Perpetual Help is a painting on wood of Grecian Style. It is about twenty

inches high and sixteen wide. On a golden background appears the Blessed Virgin with her Divine Child resting on her left arm. A dark blue veil falls in graceful folds from her head and her red garment is bordered with gold. The aureole surrounding her head is artistically ornamented and beneath it is a bright star. On either her head are four Greek side of MP OV, which signify letters.

"Mother of God."

The eyes of the Divine Child are turned sadly towards an object at His left, which seems to inspire Him with fear, and He clasps in His own His Mother's right hand as if mutely imploring her protection. He is clad in a green garment, with a red girdle which is partly concealed under a brown mantle. His head is also surrounded by a halo and above His left shoulder are the letters IC. XC., which signify "Jesus Christ." An angel standing a little above the Infant Jesus to His left holds in his hands a cross and four nails, which he presents to the Holy Child as the future instruments of His Passion. This is the cause of the expression of fear on the face of the Divine Child. Above the angel are found the Greek letters O A Γ , which signify "Gabriel

the Archangel."

To the right of the Blessed Virgin stands another angel bearing in his hands a vase containing the lance, the reed and the sponge. Over this angel are the initials, O A M which signify "Michael the Archangel."

On June 25, 1867 the picture was publicly crowned by the Chapter of St. Peter's, thus being recognized as

a Miraculous Image.

What is most impressive in this picture is the sad and wistful look of the Blessed Virgin turned upon the beholder with a loving tenderness. Novena in Honor of Our Cady of Perpetual Help

Devout clients of Our Blessed Lady will perhaps desire to know what is the meaning of a Novena, or when such a pious practice was introduced.

The practice of making a Novena, or nine days' prayer, dates back to the time when Our Blessed Lady and the Apostles, after the ascension of our Lord into heaven, remained nine days in prayer, in preparation for the coming of the Holy Ghost.

Ever since that time it has been the pious custom of the faithful to make Novenas in commemoration of some mystery in the life of Our Lord.

or in honor of the Blessed Virgin, or some Saint for whom they have particular devotion, hoping thereby to obtain some special grace or favor, through the intercession of these

privileged friends of God.

During the last half a century, perhaps the most popular Novena among all classes of the faithful throughout the entire Christian world, is in honor of Our dear and Immaculate Mother, under the sweet and consoling title of "Our Lady of Perpetual Help." Mary on her part, has ever shown herself willing to justify that beautiful title, as thousands in all parts of the globe can testify. who have received extraordinary favors, both spiritual and temporal, when invoking her intercession.

The questions are frequently asked: When and how, should a Novena in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help be made? What should be done? What prayers should be said, etc?

In answer to such questions, we will say, there is no special form prescribed by the Church; but the following prayers and pious practices are most suitable in honor of Our Blessed Lady, to obtain the graces or favors solicited.

To assist in keeping before the mind of the person or persons making the Novena, as also to inspire greater confidence and devotion, it would be well to observe the following:

(For those who are unable to observe these exterior marks of devotion, owing sometimes to peculiar surroundings, it will suffice to say the prayers privately.)

- 1. Place a picture of Our Lady of Perpetual Help in a prominent place in your house, and before the picture two candles, which should be burning while the prayers of the Novena are being recited.
- 2. Say nine Hail Marys each day of the Novena, with one of the prayers found on pages 39, 40 and 41 of this Manual.
- If possible, have all the members of your family join in the Novena.
- 4. Perform little acts of selfdenial. Give alms to some poor person or assist in other good works.
- 5. Make some promise to Our Blessed Lady, should the request be granted, for instance, to have a Mass of Thanksgiving said in her honor.

6. Receive the Sacraments of Penance and Holy Communion during the Novena, thereby rendering yourself more worthy to obtain the favor asked.

A Novena in honor of Our Lady of Perpetual Help may be made at any time during the year; but it is very appropriate to make it during the nine days preceding the principal feasts celebrated by the Church in her honor, which are the following:

1. The Purification, Feb. 2, No-

vena begins Jan. 24.

2. The Annunciation, Mar. 25, No-

vena begins Mar. 16.

3. Feast of Our Lady of Perpetual Help, the Sunday preceding June 24. Novena begins Friday of the foregoing week.

4. The Visitation, July 2, Novena

begins June 23.

5. The Assumption, Aug. 15, Novena begins Aug. 6.

6. The Nativity, Sept. 8, Novena

begins Aug. 30.

7. The Presentation, Nov. 21, Novena begins Nov. 12.

8. The Immaculate Conception, Dec. 8, Novena begins Nov. 29.

THE REDEMPTORIST LAY BROTHER

No long period of training is required of a lay brother. Nevertheless, he is given sufficient time to try out the lay brother's life before making his final decision.


The young man who desires to become a lay brother applies for admission (see below). Then he goes to Ephrata, Penna. where he makes a postulancy for at least six months. Then he becomes a novice brother for a vear.

During this year of novitiate, he tries out community life as a religious and the Superior representing the Redemptorists tries him out to find out whether he is fitted to become a religious. As a novice, he wears the garb

of a lay brother.

Even after this year, he need not make any final decision. He takes his vows for three years. This is followed by another year living under the vows. Then if he has convinced himself and his Superiors that he will be a good and happy Redemptorist lay brother, he is permitted to take vows for life.

Bishop Neumann is the first Bishop of a See in the United States whose virtues have been declared heroic by the Church, Dec. 11, 1921.

Further steps may now be taken toward his Beatification. Pray often that God may soon grant this honor to America.

Ven. Neumann was born in Prachatitz, Bohemia, on March 28, 1811. His love for the American missions led him to sail for New York in 1836. That same year he was ordained priest for the diocese of New York, where he labored for four years. He then became an American Redemptorist missionary. He was consecrated Fourth Bishop of Philadelphia, March 28, 1852. He died in his episcopal city in the odor of sanctity, Jan. 5, 1860. His remains lie in the crypt of St. Peter's Church, Fifth St. and Girard Ave., Philadelphia.

OBJECT OF THE PURGATORIAN SOCIETY

The special object of the Purgatorian Society, as the term implies, is to foster among the faithful a lively faith in the following three truths of our holy religion:

That after this life there is a middle state of suffering, to which are sent for a time souls, which though in a state of grace and in God's friendship, have not yet fully satisfied the Divine justice for the debt of temporal punishment due for their venial sins, or for their more grievous offences, the guilt of which has been remitted.
- 2. That the living by the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass, by prayers, alms-deeds, indulgences, and other

good works, offered to God for the departed, can shorten the sufferings of the Souls in Purgatory, ameliorate their condition and deliver them from their place of torment.

3. That to assist these Suffering Souls is an act of charity most holy, most salutary, and most pleasing to Almighty God.

A simple statement of the special spiritual advantages and privileges will not fail, it is confidently hoped, to induce all who have any feeling of compassion for the intense sufferings endured by the Souls in Purgatory to become faithful and active members, and to induce others to share in such an unselfish and disinterested work of charity.

OBLIGATIONS

- 1. Fifty Cents is the annual contribution. This contribution may be paid as often as one wishes to do so, and when the offerings have reached the sum of ten dollars, payment ceases, and the membership becomes perpetual and continues after death. The offering for perpetual membership may be paid at once.
- 2. Living as well as deceased persons may be enrolled at any time during the year. The year begins with the day of enrollment. Enrollment may be made by mail.

- 3. When contributions are renewed, the certificate of membership should be presented. in order to find the name in the roll-book and to receipt the payment.
- 4. The members should seek to assist the Souls in Purgatory by their prayers and good works, especially by the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass: and they should strive to promote this charitable devotion in others.

ADVANTAGES

- 1. Every day ELEVEN HIGH MASSES are offered for the living and deceased members.
- 2. The members share in the prayers offered by the Redemptorist Fathers for their benefactors, especially in the Solemn Requiem Mass celebrated annually for benefactors during the month of November.
- 3. When a living member dies, a special Mass will be offered for his or her soul upon return of the certificate.
- 4. The Rosary will be recited every Saturday evening in the Church of Our Lady of Perpetual Help for the deceased members of the Purgatorian Society.
